















Statue of the pagan goddess Ashtoreth (1Kings 11:5.33) also called Ashtaroth (Judges 2:13,10:6, 1Samuel 7:3-4, 12:10) and the queen of heaven (Jeremiah 7:18,44:17,18. Images of her are very common in the archaeological record, indicating the popularity of her cult from the earliest times to the Babylonian exile.


Ancient Egyptians Bronze statues of Isis nursing Hours (Egypt, circa 500 B.C.) She was worshiped as the queen mother as well as the patron and friend of sinners, as she listened to their prayers. Isis is often depicted as the mother of Hours, the child sun-god, suckling him in an attitude similar to that of the Virgin Mary with the Child Jesus.


