

# A Wilderness Experience

Hosea 2:14-3:5

Read Hosea 2:14-17.

1. Verse 14 starts with the word “therefore.” Go back and record the phrases that come before and after the word “therefore.”

**Forgot** – to forget, ignore, wither, to cease to care

2. **THINK:** Have you ever experienced being forgotten by someone, someone who just stopped caring about you? How did you respond?

Israel had forgotten God and all the things He had done for them, choosing instead to play the harlot with pagan gods and to indulge in fleshly desires that could do no good for them.

3. How did God choose to respond to those who had forgotten Him? (v. 14a)

4. **THINK:** What do you think of when you think of the word “allure”?

“This is a singular kind of power: ‘I will allure her;’ not, ‘I will drive her’ not even, ‘I will draw her,’ or, ‘I will drag her;’ or, ‘I will force her.’ No, ‘I will allure her.’ It is a very remarkable word, and it teaches us the allurement of love surpasses in power all other forces. That is how the devil ruins us; he tempts us with honeyed words, sweet utterances, with the baits of pleasure and the like; and the Lord in mercy determines that, in all truthfulness, He will outbid the devil, and He will win us to Himself by fascinations, enticements, and allurements which shall be stronger than any force of resistance we may offer. This is a wonderfully precious word: ‘I will allure her.’”

They had come full circle and had forgotten the Lord. Now, He would allure them back into a right relationship with Him by bringing them back into the wilderness.

9. **THINK:** Record the details of a time when God used a wilderness experience to bring about growth in your relationship with Him?

Hosea 2:14 tells us that God intended to speak comfort to Israel in the wilderness.

***Speak comfort*** – of joy and gladness, speak unto the heart (kindly)

10: **THINK HARDER:** How has God spoken comfort to you during your wilderness experiences?

Israel was on the verge of being scattered by the Assyrian Army. The Northern Kingdom would cease to exist as a nation. In these verses, God looks forward to the end of a very long wilderness experience (one that is still ongoing) and makes promises to return the land to Israel and to transform the Valley of Achor (trouble) into a door of hope at His Second Coming.

The Valley of Achan refers to another troubled time in Israel's past, where a man by the name of Achan directly disobeyed God while the Israelites were conquering the Promised Land. The Israelites would face three Canaanite cities as they entered the Promised Land. Victory over Jericho (which represented the world) would divide the land and Canaan's resources. God handed them the Jericho victory, just like Christ hands us salvation through His death on the cross as payment for our sins. Next, they

would face Ai. A small city that appeared easy to defeat after facing Jericho. Full of pride, Israel took on Ai (which represents our fleshly desires) without asking for God's help or direction and failed. Upon failing, Joshua called upon God, Who told Joshua they would have to deal with the sin in their camp before victory over Ai (the flesh) would be possible.

We receive salvation and freedom from the bondage of sin through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, but if we don't take dealing with our flesh seriously, we will forget God and stop following after Him.

Achan's sin was the first recorded sin after entering the Promised Land. This affected all of Israel, just as our own sin affects the entire body of Christ, hinders our witness, and diminishes the glory we should be bringing to God to draw others to Him.

**Master** – Baali = my lord, a deity in the northern kingdom, variation of the name Baal

The word “master” in verse 16 is *Baali*, meaning “my lord,” Baal, a deity worshipped in the northern kingdom. So, verse 16 could read, “And it shall be, in that day,” says the Lord, “That you will call Me, ‘My Husband,’ and no longer call Me ‘my Baal’.”

Read Hosea 2:18-23.

As a reminder, God is about to scatter the northern kingdom of Israel. They have chased after other gods and forgotten Him. He will use this wilderness experience to remind and allure Israel back into right relationship with Him. This restoration of Husband and wife (Israel) will take place when Israel recognizes Jesus as their Messiah (Zechariah 13:9) at the end of the Tribulation.

Stepping back, we see that Hosea is experiencing problems of his own in his relationship with his wife. They, too, have been separated.

## A Closer Look at “You will call me Husband”

Hosea 2:16

Israel was chosen and loved by God, but they were unfaithful to Him through idolatry.

33. Read Jeremiah 31:32 and Isaiah 54:5. How is God described?

But ... God’s mercy and His grace interceded. Always.

In Chapter 1, God told Hosea to marry Gomer, a prostitute. We learned in chapter 3 that she did not stay faithful to Hosea and moved from prostitute to adulteress. Still, the Lord told Hosea to find her and bring her back. This was meant to show the greatness of God's grace: "Love her as the Lord loves the Israelites, though they also commit adultery." (Hosea 3:1)

39. Read through Hosea 2:14-20. Write down everything in this passage that speaks of a husband/wife relationship.

A marriage is a covenant relationship characterized by exclusive, committed, and intimate love between a man and a woman. God calls Himself Husband to Israel because of their covenant relationship. Hosea offers a powerful image of God's deep, unending love for His covenant people.

God loves you too, and sent His Son, Jesus, to redeem you from your sins and promise you eternal life with Him.

40. Read Hebrews 9:15. What hope does this bring you?
