## Steadfast and Abounding in Love 1 Thessalonians 3

Paul had grown to love and cherish the new believers in Thessalonica. They had been eager to accept the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and he had hoped to stay longer and help them become more established in their faith. Being run out of town, Paul longed to return to Thessalonica but was hindered again and again. When he could no longer endure it, he sent Timothy.

Read 1 Thessalonians 3:1-5.

Remember from Lesson 1 that Paul had sent Timothy to Thessalonica to check on the believers. Timothy had returned to Paul with an update and some questions the church hoped to have answered. In these verses, Paul recalls the update given by Timothy.

Stand Fast - absolutely to persevere in godliness and rectitude in one's fellowship with the Lord

Paul wanted these believers to be established in their faith, understanding that suffering

No matter where we are in our journey of faith, there is always more to be accomplished. While Paul could not be with them in person, he hoped his letter would continue to encourage them in their walk with Christ.

Another way he purposed to help them was to pray. All throughout the epistles we see Paul's dedication in fervent prayer for others.
